I will be stepping back from some of my JCAA duties. As some of you know I have had back and neck problems for the past year. I am dealing with a new problem and I have to take it easy. This shows how vulnerable JCAA is because we don't have young blood that can step up as the older guys need to step back. If this does not happen JCAA will slowly go out of business. If you read last month's articles about why we support renewable energy, you will see the long list of accomplishments of JCAA. If you weren't around in '91, that was when it took us three years to pass a bill people had been working on for 50 years to make striped bass a gamefish in NJ. JCAA has been in the forefront working on issues at the Federal and State level for many years. This includes highly migratory species, public access, fisheries management, and fish advisories to name just a few. We were able to accomplish so much because of the number of people who were involved and who were willing to do the work. We have lost that. We have stopped working on some issues because we simply have not got the people to cover the meetings. If you care about the fisheries and care about preserving these fisheries for your children and grandchildren, please get involved.

Atlantic Striped Bass Board Draft Addendum II will be Going to Public Hearings Starting in November

I put the press release from ASMFC Striped Bass Board Meeting in another section of the newspaper. I could not be on the call but have read the same summary you received. The addendum should be in our hands by October 31. The JCAA Striped Bass Committee needs to have a meeting before the public hearing. I hope every club will participate. Paul

Haertel is listed as the Striped Bass Chairman so he will let you know when the meeting will be scheduled. The purpose of the meeting is to develop a list of recommendations for the membership to submit to ASMFC Public Hearings.

What We Should do About the Upcoming December Joint ASMFC & MAFMC Meeting December 11-14

At this time, we do not have the exact days during MAFMC meeting week that the Joint Meeting will take place to set the recreational limits on Summer Flounder, Black Sea Bass and Scup. We will update you as soon as we know the dates by our Face Book page and JCAA email alerts. When we learn about the proposed recommendations, we will try to get anglers and charter boat captains to show up to this meeting to share our thoughts and concerns on how they are destroying the recreational industry for these species needlessly with regulations that do nothing but effect the industry.

- 1. These regulations have not improved recruitment and just do not work.
- 2. They don't produce the results that modelers say that models will. The computer simulation models are only as good as the information they use, and we do not spend the money needed to get accurate information. Computer simulation modeling only works when models have accurate data that does not continually change.
- 3. After more the 15 years we have not seen a relaxing of regulations. It does not help that all these years of tweaking with recreational surveys and models for recreational data gathering has not solved the problem. The data collection is still not trusted and reliable. It continues to either overestimate or underestimate recreational catches. This causes the recreational anglers to lose quota when adjustments are made and face more reductions. Look what happened in the Gulf of Mexico when Congress appropriated the necessary funds to do a in depth study of the number of red snappers there. They discovered that NMFS was greatly underestimating the size of Spend the money stock. and get better information.

4. The biggest problem is that Congress and the Administration did not give NMFS the fifty million dollars requested in 2007 in order to correct these problems. We need to spend the money to get better recreational data.

Even when the data shows that the recreational quota should be increased, the overwhelming commercial makeup of MAFMC and ASMFC Boards keep it from happening. A couple of years ago the Council and Commission were supposed to do quota adjustment that invested couple of years to compile the data. Even then when they got the necessary information, they did almost no quota transfers.

Summer flounder is the perfect example of the problem. Just look at this year's regulations and next year is going to be worse for summer flounder. The MAFMC and ASMFC reviewed the Scientific and Statistical Committee (SSC) recommendations using both approaches and ultimately selected the constant approach, resulting in an ABC of 19.32 million pounds for both years. *This represents a 42% decrease compared to the 2023 ABC*. The reasons given were:

Summer Flounder 2024-2025 Specifications The 2023 management track assessment indicated that the summer flounder stock was not overfished but overfishing was occurring in 2022. While the overfishing limit has not been exceeded in recent years, it appears the projections associated with the previous assessment were overly optimistic. The assessment has been slightly underestimating fishing mortality and overestimating stock biomass, the effect of which was compounded by adding three years of data to the assessment model (2020-2022). In addition, stock recruitment has been below average since 2011 and the high estimate of 2018 recruitment in the last assessment was revised downward to recent below-average levels with the new assessment results.

Again, changing the data and model information has yearly consequences. How many more times can we raise the size limit, cut the bag limits and shorten the season to increase the spawning stock biomass to getting an increase recruitment when it has not worked. This has not had any effect on increasing recruitment since MAFMC and ASMFC went down this road.

Just the opposite has taken place. They do not pay attention to their own stock assessment reports that state over years that the size of the spawning stock mass is not the problem with recruitment. The Board and the Council just keep putting more and more restrictive management in place, killing both the recreational and the commercial fishing industry. They keep denying recreational anglers fishing opportunities from stocks that have grown. The Council and Board should refuse to keep doing this at the direction NOAA through the NMFS. If this was business and managers kept making the same mistake repeatedly, they would have been fired. Halibut, a flat fish on the west coast, was having the same problem and scientists told the manager to try fishing the spawning stock down and see what happens since it might have reached a bell shape curve. It was a novel idea and took a couple of years to convince the managers to give it a try but since what they were doing was not working, they did. Low and Behold it Worked!! We know the effects of climate change and pollution on the environment are causing significant problems with every species so NMFS needs to start thinking outside the box if the recreational and commercial industries are going to survive.

The Sad State of the Print Fishing Press

JCAA and other groups' ability to get information out to the public has become more difficult. When I first got involved, every newspaper had a reporter whose job was reporting on recreational angling and some papers had a reporter for hunting and freshwater as well. John Geiser used to have three columns a week and there was a huge section during fishing season that covered four or five pages of the paper that included both information about catching fish and also the politics of fisheries. Al Ristori did the same. They were reporters, not stringers. So, they had to fact check all their articles as all reporters do. They would reach out to Commissioners, Council members, NMFS, ASMFC and the public. They actually had health benefits and The first thing that happened when pensions. newspapers began to lose circulation was a reduction in those columns and doing away with actual reporting. The Fisherman Magazine, especially the

New Jersey edition, is one of the few examples of actual fisheries reporting on a variety of issues. Jim Hutchinson, the NJ editor, follows in the tradition by attending meetings and gathering information from a variety of reliable sources. They also have blogs, face book pages and other media besides print. Years ago, there were many other publications that did this as well, but we lost a lot of them over the years. Because of these changes it is more difficult to get accurate, timely information to the public rather than relying on internet posts that may lack the credibility of traditional print media. We need to support the existing publications. You should sign up for the release from the agencies that manage fisheries by going to their web pages. At the ASMFC and MAFMC Web Pages you can listen to most of the meetings that are taped at your convenience.

Atlantic Striped Bass Board Approves Draft Addendum II for Public Comment to Consider Measures to Reduce Fishing Mortality in 2024

ASMFC Press Release, October 19, 2023

Beaufort, NC – The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission's Atlantic Striped Bass Management Board approved for public comment Draft Addendum II to Amendment 7 to the Interstate Fishery Management Plan (FMP) for Atlantic Striped Bass. The Draft Addendum considers management measures designed to support stock rebuilding by reducing fishing mortality to the target in 2024.

The Board initiated the Draft Addendum in response to the low probability of meeting the 2029 stock rebuilding deadline if the unexpectedly high 2022 fishing mortality rate continues. The Draft Addendum builds upon the 2023 emergency action by considering management measures intended to reduce fishing mortality to the target level in 2024. Projections indicate that a 14.5% reduction in total removals relative to 2022 is needed to have a 50% chance of being at or below the fishing mortality target in 2024. For the recreational fishery, the Draft Addendum proposes recreational bag and size limit options for the ocean and Chesapeake Bay regions, including options with different limits for the for-hire modes. To about recreational address concerns allowances and compliance with recreational size limits, the Draft Addendum includes an option that would establish minimum requirements for states that authorize at-sea/shore-side filleting of striped bass (e.g., racks must be retained). For the commercial fishery, the Draft Addendum proposes a quota reduction option that would reduce commercial quotas by up to 14.5%, with the final percent reduction to be determined by the Board.

For measures beyond 2024, the Board will consider the results of the upcoming 2024 stock assessment update to inform subsequent management action. To enable an expedited management response to the 2024 stock assessment update, the Draft Addendum proposes an option that would enable the Board to respond to the results of the stock assessment updates more quickly, via Board action, if the stock is not projected to rebuild by 2029.

The Draft Addendum will be posted to the website no later than October 31st at https://asmfc.org/about-us/public-input. A subsequent press release will provide the details on the public hearing schedule and how to submit written comments. The Board will meet to review submitted comments and consider final action on the addendum in January 2024 at the Commission's Winter Meeting in Arlington, VA. ASMFC Horseshoe Crab Board Sets 2024 Specifications for Delaware Bay-Origin Horseshoe Crabs

ASMFC Press Release, October 17, 2023

Beaufort, NC – The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission's Horseshoe Crab Management Board approved harvest specifications for Delaware Bayorigin horseshoe crabs. Taking into consideration the output of the Adaptative Resource Management (ARM) Framework Revision, the Board set a harvest limit of 500,000 male and zero female Delaware Bayorigin horseshoe crabs for the 2024 season.

"The Board stands behind the ARM Framework Revision as the best available tool to set harvest limits for horseshoe crabs of Delaware Bay-origin. As a result of its use, the Delaware Bay horseshoe crab population has been increasing, with abundance of both female and male horseshoe crabs in the Delaware region at an all-time high since 2003. Despite this positive finding, the Board elected to implement zero female horseshoe crab harvest for the 2024 season as a conservative measure, considering continued public concern about the status of the red knot population in the Delaware Bay," stated Board Chair John Clark of Delaware.

To make up for the lost harvest of larger female crabs, the Board agreed to increase Maryland and Virginia's male harvest quotas with an offset ratio of 2:1 males to females. Using the allocation methodology established in Addendum VIII, the following quotas were set for New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, and Virginia:

As part of its ongoing discussions regarding how best to manage Delaware Bay-origin horseshoe crabs and in response to the Stakeholder Survey, the Board will move forward with a Horseshoe Crab Management Objectives Workshop. The Workshop will include a small group of managers, scientists, and stakeholders to explore different management objectives for the Delaware Bay-origin horseshoe crab, with a focus on multi-year specification setting and modeling approaches when selecting no female harvest. The intent would be to provide a report to the Board in time for the 2025 specification setting process next fall.

Editors Log: SBBP, The Big Picture

At the September 7th meeting of the New Jersey Marine Fisheries Council (Council), the nine-member board – it should be 11, but that's for another editor's log – discussed striped bass management and apparent efforts by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) to effectively disallow New Jersey's use of unused commercial quota for the striped bass bonus program (SBBP). Clearly, Council members and New Jersey Division of Fish & Wildlife (Division) staffers are concerned.

Tom Fote, former New Jersey governor's appointee at ASMFC and longtime legislative chair for the Jersey Coast Anglers Association (JCAA) said there was quite the battle in the late 80s to build support for making striped bass a "no sale" gamefish in New Jersey. "The culmination was in 1991 at a JCAA meeting at the Jersey Coast Shark Anglers building when Governor Florio signed the striped bass no-sale bill with Senator Lou Bassano on one side and Assemblyman John Paul Doyle on the other," said Fote of a bill that many said would never get passed.

And with that the Division launched the SBBP to allow anglers an additional striped bass using a portion of that commercial quota, describing the main goal as allowing anglers to participate in the management process while enjoying their favorite recreational pastime. New Jersey's total unused commercial striped bass quota stands at 215,912 pounds, and anglers who choose to participate in the SBBP are allotted a tag to retain one striper from 24 to less than 28 inches, agreeing to report their harvested bonus fish while maintaining detailed logbooks. "It is a popular program and provides valuable data for assessing stock status and fishing trends, making it an integral part of New Jersey's striped bass management," the Division states online.

According to official tallies, from 2005 to 2015 bonus permit holders averaged less than 10% of the available quota, which left over 90% of the allotted quota to swim free. In 2016, the annual SBBP harvest jumped to about 13%, with 17% of the available quota tallied in 2022. Comparatively speaking, Massachusetts has a commercial striper quota of 700,379 pounds. If I'm not mistaken, their commercial season opens June 16 and is not restricted exclusively to commercial fishermen, which is

probably why Massachusetts filled their entire '23 quota in just 53 days, given that just about anyone can become a part-time pinhooker by buying a license to kill 35-inch striped bass.

ASMFC views New Jersey's striped bass bonus as a "conservation equivalency" program, which they define as "Actions taken by a state which differ from the specific requirements of the FMP, but which achieve the same quantified level of conservation for the resource under management." It basically gives states autonomy to tailor size, bag and seasonal limits to meet reduction requirements or harvest limits. Clearly, Massachusetts has a "bought and paid for" conservation equivalency program, yet it seems New Jersey is the one that's under attack.

Think about it; New Jersey makes striped bass a no sale gamefish, protects an iconic fishery from commercial exploitation, and reallocates a portion of the resource to the recreational fishing community to help generate better data for state biologists, yet somehow we're the bad guys! One would think that coastal anglers would be celebrating this unheralded fisheries management win.

On September 7, Council member Bob Rush made mention of one organization in particular as saying "NJ bonus tag is the biggest joke on the coast. We are going after that." Yet should ASMFC successfully disband New Jersey's bonus program, I'm not sure what's to stop that unused quota from eventually being transferred to the interstate commercial quota trading pool. In my opinion, that "anti-Jersey" crowd isn't looking at the bigger picture, and their little "joke" could backfire in a big way.





